THE COVER STORY

The Boer War and Censored Mail 1899—1901

The term Boer, derived from the Afrikaans word for farmer, was used to describe the people in southern Africa. They traced their ancestry to **Dutch**, **German and French** Huguenot settlers who arrived in the Cape of Good Hope.

Over the years many gold and diamond mines in South Africa were controlled by Britain. As a result the British army had a presence there to supervise their interests. Tensions rose following a Boer ultimatum that the British should cease building up their forces in the region.

Why did Great Britain fight in the south of Africa? MONEY.

The South African War, or the Boer War, was the first major conflict of a century that was to be marked by wars on an international scale.

At the start of the war, Boer men would attack from the countryside. The British then rounded up the Boer women and children and put them in concentration camps. This slowed the Boer attacks.

The British also called on their colonies to send additional troops.

At the outbreak of war, Britain ruled Natal and the Cape of Good Hope. The Boers held Transvaal and the Orange Free State.

Even non-Europeans got involved. While living in South Africa, Mahatma Gandhi created the Natal Indian Ambulance Corps during the war. **(1)**

(Stamp is Great Britain Scott #600)





The British sent women and children to concentration camps, (both white and black peoples) in order to remove the source of supplies and equipment from the Boer Commandoes.

A crusading English lady, Emily Hobhouse, alerted the world to the horrors of the camps and was seen as a saint in both England and South Africa. (2)

(Stamp is Republic of South Africa Scott #469)

On the British side, troops came not just from Britain but also from other parts of the empire, especially Canada and Australia.

Australian troops arrived in South Africa in late December 1899. The Australian military arrived after a series of British defeats known as "Black Week". (Dec. 10–17, 1899)

During that time 2,300 British and allied soldiers were killed or wounded by the Boers.



Henri Bourassa, who was elected to the House of Commons in 1896, was the face of French-Canadians. He was against sending any troops. In his book "Henri Bourassa", A. Roy Petrie wrote:

"Bourassa failed to see how a few thousand farmers in South Africa could possibly be a threat to Great Britain, let alone to Canada". (4)



Bourassa: No Don't Send Troops

Prime Minister Laurier compromised and allowed volunteer troops to go and fight with the British.

Censored mail from Southern Africa during the Boer War

Letters from Southern Africa were carefully examined by censors. Mail was opened to insure sensitive information about British troops and tactics was not being spread out of South Africa.

Official rules for the guidance of Press Censors in Southern Africa A Press Censor will be posted to every Column and important Station. All letters are liable to censorship. Casualties must not be given by name without confirmation. Private messages should be confined to personal or business matters. **(5)**



Conclusion: The Boer War was orchestrated by England towards the end of what was then known as the mighty British Empire.

Requests made to other British Colonies for additional troops was met with tepid acceptance and vocal opposition. In the end the Boer Republics came under British control becoming the Orange River Colony and Transvaal Colony. Today these lands and others make up the Republic of South Africa.

Mel had been a stamp collector most of his life with the usual gaps due to education, family and military pursuits. Mel had been a member of the Central Florida Stamp Club since July 2009. He was an active member of the CFSC having served in many capacities and his contributions to the club will be deeply missed. He had served on the CFSC Board since 2016 and had served as the Board Secretary for almost as long. He enjoyed being a part of the decision making and leadership aspects of the CFSC. He had shared his expertise and knowledge in marketing and computer graphic art by designing the FLOREX cachets and cancellers for the past ten years. He also edited and distributed the CFSC "Bourse" for over ten years—which provided an opportunity for CFSC members and dealers to advertise, as well as buy and sell philatelic material. He was a regular volunteer staffing the Maitland and FLOREX stamp shows. In 2018 Mel was the recipient of

Mel's involvement and participation in philately extended far beyond just the CFSC. He was also a member of the—American Philatelic Society (APS), American Topical Association (ATA), American Society of Polar Philatelists (ASPP), Christmas Seals & Christmas Seal Society (CSCSS), Channel Island Specialist Society (CISS), and the Plate Number Coil Club (PNC³). Mel served as the Treasurer for the PNC³.



Mel served in Vietnam during his military career and had also long been a member of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary where he served as Editor of their newsletter.

Mel is survived by his wife Michelle, who often attended the CFSC Holiday Parties.

A few interesting Postmarks! By Mike Schumacher

I would suspect that most stamp collectors have taken note of a few postmarks, as they sorted through their

stamps (unless of course they only collect mint stamps). But if we play our cards right, as we shuffle through our piles of stamps, we might be surprised that we could be holding some interesting cards (I mean postmarks). Yes, it is possible to be holding the Ace, King, Queen, Jack and Joker of postmarks.

1. "Ace" is a small community in Polk County, Texas on state highway 146.

2. "King" is located 15 miles northwest of Winston-Salem. Population 2020—about 7100.

3. "Queen" is located about 16 miles north of Bedford. The post office in Queen closed in 2005. Its zip code was 16670.

4. "Jack" an unincorporated community in Dent County, southeast Missouri.

The post office in Jack opened in 1905 and closed in 1954. 5. "Joker" is an unincorporated community in Calhoun County, West Virginia named after Joker Sewel. Its post office closed.

If you think this is peculiar, then you should stop by Peculiar, Missouri. It was established in 1868. Its first Postmaster was Edgar Thomson. Its located in Cass County about 25 miles south of Kansas City. The story goes that Thomson submitted the name of "Excelsior" to the Postmaster General, but was told that there already was a town by that name in Missouri. He submitted a couple more names, with the same results. He then said he didn't care what name the Postmaster General would assign, as long as it was something "Peculiar". That is how the town got its name. Current population about 2500.

If you think that was a peculiar story, then you won't find it no accident how Accident, Maryland ended up with its name. Back in 1751 George Deakins was given a land grant by King George II of England. Mr. Deakins hired and sent out two teams of surveyors to find the best area of land in western Maryland. And it just so happened that unbeknownst to the two teams of surveyors, they had surveyed the exact same plot of land.

The town of Accident was incorporated in 1916.

You might think these stories are stranger than "Ripley's Believe it or Not", but I can assure you that they are true and you can bet your money on it. And you don't even have to go to Money, Mississippi to place the




wager. The town of Money, Mississippi is located in Leflore County near Greenwood and was named for U.S. Senator Hernando De Soto Money, who served in the U.S. House of Representatives (1875—1885) and was appointed to the U.S. Senate in December 1909 and served until March 1911. The post office in Money, Mississippi was established in 1901. Current population about 28,000.

As the hour grows late (nearly midnight) it might be time to conclude this article with Midnight, Mississippi, an unincorporated community in Humphreys County about 5 miles north of Louise &



3 miles southwest of Silver City. The post office in Midnight was established in 1897 and closed in October 2002. Its zip code was 39115. In 2010, its population was less than 200. As the story would have it, the town got its name as the result of a late night poker Game, when one unlucky gambler ran low on money, so he bet part of his land (and lost).

The winner, then looked at his watch and indicated that it was nearly midnight, and declared that is what he was going to call the land. So remember, as you sort those stamps, be sure to pay attention to the postmarks, you never know what you will discover.

Listing: "US 1610c (1975-79) \$1 - MNH EFO: Brown Inverted (CIA Invert) w/ Cert Scarce/Rare". Offered for \$900,000. Free mailing with 30-day return policy.

I was offered a \$100,000 discount on the purchase recently. (I have been watching this listing for about 4 years.) Still not enough to bring it into reality. Scott CV 2024 of \$17,000. The lister has a long and detailed story about the stamp. There are obvious stretches of imagination in the narration as they try to equate the stamp to the inverted Jenny. The comparison is weak at best – especially since in recent months it has become evident that another sheet of the CIA Inverts has been "found" and is being dispersed in the marketplace. For those wondering there could technically be 400 (4

panes of 100) of these stamps in existence. This added discovery will of course impact the catalog value that Scott's assigns to the stamp. Watch and see what happens – it should be interesting.
